PS Ron will be handing out pins for Sports Medal participants.



Velkommen, Baby Boom!

A pandemic-related baby boom has sent Norwegian families scrambling to find perfect names for their new additions. 2021 saw over 3,000 more births in Norway than in 2020. Thankfully, help has come from an entity with a long history flaunting imaginative naming skills: IKEA.

Employees at the Norwegian branch of the Swedish retail giant combed through its catalogs, curating a "name bank" overflowing with over 800 monikers inspired by over 70 years of flat-pack tables, chairs, chandeliers, desks, and a mish-mash of other household staples.

While many IKEA product labels are inspired by Swedish place names, several others have appellations associated with humans. They range from the more typical, such as Billy, a strikingly modern black and white chair from 1970, to the more exotic such as Ulrika, a dainty side table available in 1958. The names are accompanied on the website by a picture of the item, the year it was introduced, and a description in Norwegian. The descriptions can apply to both the furniture item and to your newest family member.

Hurtigruten Hopes for Zero Emission Ship by 2030

The Hurtigruten Norwegian Coastal Express has operated for nearly 130 years, traveling between 34 ports, from Bergen to Kirkenes. It is a popular way for travelers to see remote Norwegian communities and beautiful fjords. Recently, the cruise company announced that by 2030, the route will feature its first zero-emissions passenger ship. As part of the initiative, Hurtigruten has partnered with a Norwegian research institute, SINTEF, to research and analyze the ship building program.

While Hurtigruten has made many strides towards sustainability in the past. Hurtigruten Group CEO, Daniel Skjeldam, called the project its "most ambitious sustainability initiative to

date." They will first start with the Norwegian Coastal Express as its route consists of frequent anchorages, making it easier to "fuel up." Then they would like to expand the practices to their expedition ships, which travel to places like Antarctica and Alaska.

Hurtigruten plans to be very open with their findings in hopes that the rest of the industry can benefit, as well.

Remembering Kris Juul



Lodge member Kristen "Kris" Juul passed away on March 19, 2022, but due to COVID restrictions a memorial service was not held until this year at the Carbondale Unitarian Fellowship Hall. Kris had a remarkable life, first in Norway and then later in America. Kris' story will be shared in two parts in this and in next month's newsletter. The first part tells of Kris' remarkable experiences during WWII, and the second will tell of his coming to America.

Kris was born on Aug. 2, 1923, in Rjukan, Norway. The youngest of eight children, he grew up in Årøsund, a small village on an island in the Oslo Fjord. In 1940 Kris was in gymnasium (Norwegian high school) when Germany occupied Norway soon after the beginning of WWII. The Nazi's actively sought to recruit bright young Nordic men to their cause and Kris was at top of his class. "Every year he had the highest scores in the country," explains his wife, Joan. Tall, blond, and bright, Kris was considered a perfect candidate for the German army. In 1941, after graduation Kris was ordered to enlist in the Schutzstaffel or S.S. If he refused, he would be sent to a concentration camp. Instead, Kris chose to join the Norwegian Underground to work

against the Nazi occupation. Kris' daughter, Kitty, reports that "He agreed to operate a radio in his bedroom --the only radio in Arøsund and report the news he learned from the BBC. One night the S.S. saw the light in his room and knocked on his door. His mom answered, and they asked to see who was upstairs. All the radio equipment was out. Had they seen that, he would have been shot. But, because he was so fluent in German, he met them at the stairs. They just wanted to ask him to shut off the light to avoid bombings. He was able to respond in German so they never went up the stairs.

In 1943 Kris narrowly escaped capture when the Nazis raided the University of Oslo, where he was attending school. The Nazis arrested all the professors and 1,250 students many of whom were sent to the Buchenwald and Sennheim concentration camps in Germany for military training. "All the intellectuals were taken away," Kitty reports. Luckily Kris didn't have classes that day and went into hiding. The Underground hid him in Oslo for weeks while his parents remained at home unaware of his fate. For the safety of his family, he chose not to contact them and tell them where he was.

The Underground helped many young men escape to other countries where they would be safe and could better serve Norway. After hiding for several weeks in the university president's apartment in Oslo, "The Underground came to get me out of the country. They took me to a harbor to a fishing boat and then at night they took me across the North Sea to Sweden." Kris and a friend traveled through the narrow Oslofjord inlet to the North Sea hidden under fishing nets to conceal themselves from Nazi patrol boats. "The German boats went back and forth all the time looking for refugees," Kris explained.

After sailing for 10 hours, he finally arrived in neutral Sweden at four o'clock in the morning. "They put me on an island which was as big as this room with no vegetation, and I fell asleep. When I woke up somebody in a uniform stood looking down at me. It was a Swedish policeman and he said, 'welcome to freedom." After five years of being under Nazi occupation, the idea of freedom was fantastic." Kris stayed in Sweden for several weeks along with 50,000 Norwegian refuges until he was relocated to London.

In England, he met the Crown Prince Olav V who was the Norwegian Chief of Defense. Kris then enlisted in the Royal Norwegian Air Force, intending to become to be a pilot, but this training was discontinued because the war was nearing its end. Instead, he served as a geographer, providing maps for Allied forces. London was devastated due to the continuing German bombardment or "Blitz." "The city was in ruins, but the people were still strong." British and

American planes would fly over London on their way to bombard Germany. "I still have the incredible feeling of joy. All these planes were going to bomb my enemy and we were going to win," said Kris. Despite these heroic air strikes, Kris was traumatized because he knew only one third of the planes would come back. "Many of these young soldiers were flying their first flight and their last. This is traumatic but it's true and they died for us, and these were young boys from all over the country." When the war ended, the BBC announced the names of the Norwegian boys who survived and his parents finally heard he was safe and coming home to Norway.

Norwegian Cinnamon Thumbs

Cookie Ingredients: Ingredients for Rolling:

5 Tbsp. sugar 1 tsp. cinnamon 1 cup butter 1/4 cup sugar

2 cups flour 1 tsp. vanilla

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Beat the sugar and butter together until fluffy. Add the flour and vanilla, and beat until dough comes together.

Take a small amount of dough (about the size of a tennis ball), and roll is gently into a long, skinny rope 1/2" in diameter (about the width of your pinky). Using a sharp knife, cut the dough into 2" pieces, making sure to cut on the diagonal instead of straight across.

Place cookies a few inches apart on a lined baking sheet, and bake 8-10 minutes, until just beginning to turn golden on the bottom edges. Remove cookies from oven and allow to cool slightly. While cookies are cooling, combine the cinnamon and sugar for rolling in a small bowl. When cookies are cool enough to handle, roll each one gently in the cinnamon sugar, and place on a cooling rack to finish cooling.
